
20th Asian Games AICHI-NAGOYA

The 20th Asian Games are coming to AICHI-NAGOYA in 2026









In 2026, Asia's biggest sports event is coming to AICHI-NAGOYA in Japan!

Organized by the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA) every four years, the Asian Games are the biggest multi-sport games in Asia. The first games took place in 1951, not long after the end of World War II, in the hope that sports could strengthen the relationships between Asian countries that had been separated by the war and contribute to lasting peace throughout the region. The 20th Asian Games will take place in AICHI-NAGOYA in 2026. This is the third time the games will be held in Japan, and 30 years since the last time.

Unique sports of the Asian Games

Part of the special appeal of the Asian Games is the regional sports that take place alongside regular Olympic sports.

Sepak Takraw

A traditional sport dating from the 9th century, originally played in the countries of Southeast Asia. "Sepak" means "kick" in Malaysian and "Takraw" means "a ball woven from cane" in Thai. Players use their toes, knees and heads to knock the ball over the net and back to the opponents' side of the court in three touches or less.



Kabaddi

Two teams of seven players are divided into two halves of a court. An attacker from one team enters the opponent's half calling out "kabaddi, kabaddi!" This attacker tries to touch one or more of the defending players and run back to his own half to score points for each tagged player. If the defenders stop the attacker by grabbing his legs, arms or torso and tackling him, they score a point instead.
