A Safe, Trusted and Comfortable Athletes Village

Concept

An athlete's village with a capacity of some 15,000 people including athletes and other authorized personnel will be established on a site that is within a short distance to major venues including the Mizuho Park Athletic Stadium, the city's athletics stadium that is tentatively designated as the Games' main venue. The village provides its guests with a living environment where they can stay safely, securely, and comfortably.

Negotiations have been underway for the relocation of the Nagoya Racecourse. The land that will be available after the demolition of the current racecourse is one of the village candidate sites.

Reflecting Aichi Prefecture's status as Japan's leading producer of ornamental flowers, the Athletes Village will be decorated with various planted and arranged flowers to create a relaxing place for the athletes.

Safe, Trusted and Comfortable

The Athletes Village will not only offer good accommodation for every athlete but also ensure a safe and trusted space with security measures using advanced technology and fire and disaster procedures coordinated with local municipalities. Good food is of course an essential part of athletes' conditioning, so in addition to Japanese cuisine, the main dining areas will also offer various Asian dishes, as well as the unique local "Nagoya cuisine" and dishes using local food products. Recreation facilities and social spaces, as well as areas for meditation and prayer, will be available around the Village to give the athletes with their diverse backgrounds a comfortable place to stay.

Hospitality

All of the signage and notices inside the Athletes Village will be multilingual and illustrated to make them easy to understand for everyone. Several multilingual concierge desks will also be available to address the various needs of all the residents of the Village.

Environment

To minimize the environmental impact of the Athletes Village, its construction will rely on renewable and next-generation energy sources and be planned as compactly as possible by optimally locating the various facilities inside the Village. Our eco-friendly operations during the Games will include "green procurement" as well as a comprehensive garbage reduction and separation/recycling measures.

Athletes Village Facilities

Accommodations in the Athletes Village will be designed to help athletes stay in peak condition. The Village will include various other facilities for the comfort of the athletes and other residents, such as recreational facilities, multi-faith center, general clinic, NOC service center, dining hall, transportation center, and welcome center.

Traffic and Transportation

International Access

Chubu Centrair International Airport (Centrair) is a major international airport that opened for the 2005 World Exposition in Aichi, Japan (EXPO 2005). Today, the airport handles 97,000 flights and 10.42 million passengers annually (based on 2015 figures).


With 351 weekly international flights that serve 40 cities around the world, including 310 weekly flights serving 35 cities throughout Asia, Centrair offers outstanding access from cities across Asia. Domestically, the airport has 84 daily flights serving 18 cities throughout Japan (as of September 1 2016), providing good access from all parts of the country.

Centrair is a 24-hour airport with plans for a new terminal (scheduled to open in 2019) and other improvements, including a second runway. The region as a whole is currently strengthening its international networks in anticipation of the 2026 Asian Games.

The UK-based Skytrax, which rates international airports for customer service, has again chosen Centrair as the World's Best Regional Airport 2016 for the second straight year, and as the Best Regional Airport: Asia for the sixth straight year, as part of its World Airport Awards 2016. The airport will provide athletes, other participants, spectators and the like from around the world with an excellent and safe experience.



Comfortable Travel for Everyone



Modes of Transportation

Athletes and other participants at the Games can use regular shuttle buses that will run between the Athletes Village, competition venues, practice areas, airport, and central Nagoya. Olympic Council of Asia (OCA) officers and other VIPs will use private automobiles.

A system will monitor games-related vehicle travel and real-time traffic information to provide appropriate guidance and ensure timely arrival at venues even in the event of unforeseen circumstances such as traffic accidents.

In addition to existing public transportation options, spectators will be served by shuttle buses between competition venues and major transit hubs in the prefecture to ensure fast and reliable transportation.

Improvements are now being made to accessibility and universal design in the prefectural transportation system to ensure that athletes, participants, and spectators from around the world will enjoy a comfortable experience at the Games.

These traffic and transportation plans will be fully discussed and coordinated with municipal agencies as well as roadway administrators and transportation companies to ensure safe, smooth, and reliable travel everywhere for the Games.

Convenient Access from the Airport to Main **Facilities of the Games**

Travel between Centrair and central Nagoya where the main competition venues of the Games will be located takes approximately 30 minutes via expressway. The airport is also served by rail, taking just 30 minutes to Nagoya Station.

Reliable Medical Services

Medical Services in Aichi Prefecture

Aichi Prefecture has 322 hospitals and 5,338 general clinics (as of October 1, 2015).

Additionally, the prefecture has four university hospitals that are designated under the Medical Care Act as "advanced treatment hospitals" capable of providing advanced medical services and developing medical techniques for the treatment of conditions that are not easily treated at general hospitals.

Emergency Medical Services

In 1981, Aichi Prefecture established a system for providing emergency medical care information. Using the system, the city has been offering information in Japanese 24 hours a day/7 days a week on medical centers and clinics that are open to take in patients. The prefecture also has 22 emergency and critical care centers that accept critical patients 24/7.

International Support

Aichi Prefecture provides via automated voice system or facsimile information in English, Chinese, Spanish, Portuguese, and Korean on medical centers and clinics where services are offered in foreign languages.

Disaster Response

In addition to Nagoya Airport, which has been designated a staging care unit (SCU) in the event of a large-scale disaster, Aichi Prefecture also has 35 designated disaster base hospitals. Additionally, the 35 hospitals in the prefecture have a total of 71 teams designated as Disaster Medical Assistance Teams (DMAT).

Medical Services for Participants in the Games

Necessary medical services will be provided at the Games in coordination with the Aichi Medical Association and other organizations. We will also coordinate with emergency hospitals to create medical procedures for the Games to ensure safe and reliable medical services for both participants and spectators.

Doping Control

To reflect increased international anti-doping activities, we will at all times comply with the latest international standards of the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) and coordinate with the Japan Anti-Doping Agency (JADA) to ensure such compliance. Doping controls will be implemented under the guidance of OCA and include appropriate data management and disclosure to ensure the Games are clean.

A Jointly-Constructed Risk Management System

Basic Plan

The Aichi Prefectural Police currently employs 13,519 police officers (as of April 1, 2016) and has extensive experience in securing international conferences and events, including the 2005 World Exposition in Aichi, the Tenth Meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (COP10) in 2010 and the 42nd G7 Summit (Ise-Shima Summit) in 2016. In addition to police and fire departments, we will also coordinate with private security firms to ensure the safety of the Games.

Security Methods

We are considering using biometric systems to minimize the burden on athletes, OCA officers and other participants. Additionally, we will arrange travel routes for VIPs separately from those for other participants as part of our strict safety measures.

To prevent overcrowding and accidents as spectators travel between venues or when entering/leaving them, we will post security officers as needed to provide appropriate guidance.

Thorough inspections of personal items and belongings will be conducted at all facilities to prevent unauthorized entrance and ensure the safety of participants and spectators alike.



Disaster Response

In the event of a disaster, police and firefighting services including Nagoya City Fire Department will be ready to cooperate in taking immediate and effective actions to mitigate the damage to the maximum extent possible. In case of a special emergency situation involving terror attacks using chemical substance, specialized units including Counter-NBC Terrorism Squad of Aichi Prefectural Police Department and Nagoya City Fire Department Emergency Task Forces ("Hyper Rescue Nagoya") will respond to the situation accurately.



Accommodation Outside the Athletes Village

A Large Supply of High-Quality Accommodations

Abundant Accommodations in the Prefecture

In Nagoya City and other parts of Aichi Prefecture, there are approximately 900 facilities with a total of 44,000 rooms capable of accommodating 82,000 people. In addition to conventional hotels, there are various other types of accommodations, including traditional Japanese-style inns (ryokan), "weekly mansion" apartments for longer stays, and youth hostels.

VIP Accommodations


There are numerous first-class hotels in Nagoya City and other parts of Aichi Prefecture. These hotels will be designated for OCA and other VIP accommodations to ensure smooth travel to/from competition venues and the Athletes Village.

Good Access to Tourist Destinations in Japan

Aichi Prefecture also offers convenient access to various tourist destinations in the Tokyo metropolitan area and Kansai region, as well as throughout Japan. Tourist guides and websites will be created for spectators at the Games to help them take advantage of such opportunities to travel while in Japan for the Games.

Eco-friendly Games

Environmental Initiatives by Aichi Prefecture and Nagoya City

Aichi Prefecture and Nagoya City have previously hosted international environmental events such as the 2005 World Exposition in Aichi (EXPO 2005 AICHI), the Tenth Meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity in 2010 (COP10), and UNESCO World Conference on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) in 2014.

As hosts, Aichi Prefecture and Nagoya City supported these events with eco-friendly operations, thus fostering a high level of environmental awareness in the region and promoting various environmental activities involving citizens, NPOs, corporations, educational institutions, and others.

As an environmentally advanced region, Aichi Prefecture and Nagoya City intend to expand the reach of such environmental activities to encourage voluntary efforts across all facets of life, the region, economic activities and so on, in order to build a sustainable society.

4th Basic Environmental Plan for Aichi Prefecture (adopted May 2014)

Pursuing the goal of becoming "Environmental Capital Aichi" to be realized and passed on to future generations by all citizens, the prefecture has been working to develop Aichi into a community that embodies three images of how the prefecture should be: the place where environment protection and economic development exist in harmony; the locality where people can live safely and comfortably; and the community where residents work in collaboration with each other, through promoting the cooperation and collaboration among various entities including the prefecture's residents, businesses, NPOs, and local governments.

3rd Basic Environmental Plan for Nagoya City (adopted December 2011)

Citizens, businesses, and governmental agencies are collaborating on initiatives to promote Nagoya as an "environmental capital built collectively around our local cultures" based on the four qualities of an environmental city, namely, a city that is "healthy and safe," "recycles," "coexists with nature," and "minimizes carbon."



An Asian Games Worthy of an Environmentally Advanced Region

Our environmental initiatives have earned us high praise at past international events. We will utilize such initiatives at the Asian Games to ensure that the operation of the Games is worthy of an environmentally advanced region.

Specifically, existing facilities will be used for the Games wherever possible. Regarding vehicles, we are considering using next-generation vehicles such as fuel cell buses and vehicles (FCV) and electric automobiles. We will take steps to limit CO2 emissions, for instance, by using renewable energy sources as much as possible for hydrogen and electricity as fuels.

Additionally, we will reduce the environmental burden and encourage green procurement, for instance, by reducing energy use and using timber from forest thinning. We will also actively encourage the 3 Rs (reduce, reuse, and recycle) by participants and all others involved in the Games.

Aichi and Nagoya have extensive experience of providing venues for various sports at international sporting events. We also have experience of hosting important international conferences attended by the world's VIPs, including the ITS World Congress and the Tenth Meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (COP10), as well as other international events attended by many people from around the world, such as the 2005 World Exposition. Our know-how based on these past experiences will ensure that the Games run safely and smoothly.

4 Support for Athletes

Fostering Junior Athletes

Programs to Support Aichi Athletes in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics

These programs exist to strengthen athletic ability and foster future generations of athletes. They aim to raise the level of designated athletes to represent Japan in Olympic sports. The goal is not only to send many athletes from Aichi Prefecture to the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and create a sense of unity and excitement among prefectural residents, but also to create a virtuous cycle of support that promotes sports in the prefecture.

Training Program to Strengthen Designated Junior Athletes (Junior High and High School Students)

For designated junior athletes (junior high and high school students) still developing both physically and mentally, this program, in cooperation with the prefecture-affiliated public utility foundation Institute of Sports Medicine and Science, conducted physical checks to help athletes acquire accurate basic knowledge and techniques and continue to engage in competitive sports.

Examination and measurement results not only provided athletes with an understanding of their own physical abilities and body's characteristics but also helped experts give feedback to understand what training methods, etc. were needed to improve their athletic ability and how to use the methods in daily practice.

The physical check was conducted twice during the year to assess the results of the program to strengthen athletic ability and compare the physical condition of athletes in the on-season and off-season.



Based on an agreement with Aichi Prefecture ("Agreement on the Promotion of Physical Education and Sports"*), Tokaigakuen University held lectures on the topic of "Reaching the Olympics" as well as motion analysis performed by leading aquatics (swimming) instructors using underwater cameras for the prefecture's top-performing junior high school students (those behind the strengthening program-designated athletes). The goal of the program was to instill motivation and develop practical skills for strengthening athletic ability. *In addition to Tokaigakuen University, agreements were also signed with Chukyo University, Shigakkan University, and Nippon Sport Science University.
